News from around school


Beech

A warm welcome to our new classmate, Kiera who has fitted in perfectly. The class have enjoyed getting to know Kiera and inviting her to join them in their learning and play.

Beech Class have completed their learning journey through 'Bee and Me', creating a book as a class. Each child chose a page from the original, wordless picture book and added their own narrative. This will be collated and copies will be available to parents from Monday if they would like one. They certainly enjoyed the honey tasting on Friday with lots of the children trying something new - the comb! They were able to describe its taste, texture, look and smell.

The Year 1 children have been completing assessments this week in mathematics and reading and I have been incredibly impressed by their resilience and effort. Our enhancements outside for this week have been focusing on the children's communication and turn taking, sharing water beads, building a marble run together and passing equipment through a small hatch to make a sandcastle.

Another huge thank you to the PTA and Twinkle Toes for the selection of produce for our edible garden. The children loved planting them, trying to work out what each plant is and where they should be planted. We harvested our first strawberry on Wednesday, which was chopped into (lots of very small) pieces and shared amongst the class.





Chestnut

Last Friday, the children had the challenge of trying to decide which base would be the best to use for their pizza. They had a number of different breads to try: pitta, tortilla, flatbread, baguette, naan and bagel. The majority of the children are choosing to use the tortilla because "it is nice and big", "it goes hard when it is baked" and "it has a plain flavor so you can taste the toppings".

In English this week, the children are concluding their work based on our book 'Pesky Plastic'. The children have explored questions in more detail this week and the features that are used in a persuasive letter; they then put these features into a letter they have written persuading people that dropping rubbish into the sea was bad. From the looks of focus on the faces of the children, it is clear that this is a topic they have really enjoyed and felt passionate about.

During History this week, the children were asked to make comparisons between RMS Titanic and the modern day equivalent, the Symphony of the Seas. This began with the children reconstructing the images of the two ships, before sorting the relevant information.











Willow

This week in Willow class we have been revisiting geometry in maths. Year 3 have been sorting and describing 2D and 3D shapes using a range of precise vocabulary. For example, a cone has 2 faces, 1 vertex, and 1 edge. Ask your children if they can describe any other 3D shapes. Year 4 have moved onto writing coordinates for the first quadrant. They have been trying to draw shapes by only using coordinates and then checking their work by plotting their coordinates in a grid and seeing if it is the shape they were trying to create. We have had some very interesting shapes being created.

In English, we have been planning and starting to write our own story - a lovely narrative set in the early hundreds, just after the Romans left Britain. Our stories feature Kings, Queens, dogs, and even a dragon. Very exciting! The children have been working hard to plan their narratives whilst using lots of discussion to help talk through ideas and create an interesting story.

In Science, we have been writing up and discussing our long-term experiment. We have had a look at our plants two weeks after planting them and leaving them in different areas of the room with different amounts of light. We have discovered that some of the plants aren't growing like the others, and having less light prevents the plants from looking healthy. However, they still grow quite tall.

In History, we started looking at where the Saxons came from, learning that they came from what is modern-day Germany, Denmark, and the Netherlands along with the Jutes and Angles. We have been creating maps and information packs, person profiles and even a little bit of crafts, beginning to think about the brooches they would have worn.





Oak

This week we have had SATS and I was most impressed by the children's attitudes.

They have worked really hard this week and been positive and sensible about the process. All this will help them when they have tests as they go through school, so it is a useful exercise.

We finished the week with a sausage and bacon breakfast, which all the class enjoyed, as well as a few of the teachers!

Then we set off to Bentley Woods....

As you know our English Learning Journey and our Art this term is based on the text The Lost Words, and it seemed absolutely appropriate that we should actually go to our local woods and see the subjects of the poems in their natural state.

We looked at the flora and fauna and took photographs, which will be useful for our art work. We took in the sights and sounds of the woods and appreciated all the bluebells that are carpeting the wood at the moment.

The children lay on their yoga mats and experienced some forest bathing. They lay in silence and immersed themselves in the sounds of the wood. It was really quite magical and the children said afterwards that it was a relaxing and affirming experience.

We finished the trip with a more energetic game of 40 / 40 in, before returning to school.

In Geography....

We have made large 3D maps to explore both physical and human geographical features of the United Kingdom. Once they were finished, they class presented them and made links between the different maps.

We have continued to read our guided reading book- Beetle Boy, and we are now delving deeper into the mysterious disappearance of Dr Bartholomew Cuttle.

We have managed a good balance this week with tests and learning and next week- normal service resumes!
