How long have you been a governor?

Last week, Beech class continued their learning about the Hindu festival of light, Diwali, as part of our Interfaith week. They found out about some of the traditions and rituals people of this faith practice. They explored items that can be found in a Hindu temple and listened to the story behind the festival. The class made their own salt dough to make diyas (candle lamps).

This week, we are learning about the first Christmas. The children found out about the Nativity story and thought about why Jesus was born in a stable and who visited the special baby. The children enjoyed having a birthday party for Jesus and played games to learn about the characters.

In English, we are reading 'The Stick Man' and thinking about journey stories. The children drew maps of the story and considered different uses for a stick.









Chestnut class have continued to strive to be better and approach all work with a fantastic attitude. They are becoming wonderful geologists with a real interest in the world around them. They have created strong links between their local school environment and the wider world.

Chestnut children have identified some key physical landmarks in West Tytherley village and related these to the physical landmarks and features of Winchester. They could recognise different landmarks in Winchester and were able to explain why they might be notable places. The children could recall the things they had learned and share their newfound knowledge with adults around school.

In Maths, the children loved learning how to use fractions in their work. They identified a ½ very well and used this on their newly learned 2D shapes. Chestnuts also used this outside with their outdoor learning. The Year 1s have continued with addition and subtraction and using number lines to represent different calculations. The Year 2s have developed their knowledge of ordering and comparing numbers, as well as representing them in multiple different ways.

In English, we have begun work on the wordless book 'Flashlight'. We will be using this to guide and invent our own stories and sentences. The children's imaginations have already been extremely creative with what they want to use in their stories. We have role-played in the classroom to explore the different nocturnal animals and used 'torches' to explore the world around us.

Chestnut class have been practising so hard for the Nativity. They have diligently learned their lines, as well as the lines of the songs in the play. I am so proud of their commitment and excitement, and I personally cannot wait for you all to see how hard they have worked.

Thank you all for attending the first parents evening this academic year. It was a pleasure to see you all and I am really impressed with how well the children are doing.

Outdoor Learning

In Forest School last week, the children learned about different trails. They went on a picture trail around the school grounds. At the end of the trail, they searched for and found their own treasure (special natural items). They used this treasure to make imprints in clay to create special Forest School Christmas Decorations to take home to put on their tree.

This week, the children finished their Christmas decorations and had a go at lighting a fire before enjoying a warming hot chocolate around their fire.



In Willow Class we have been very busy in the last couple weeks. The children have completed their assessments, completed their big write for English and been on our first trip - to Hillier Gardens.

In Maths this term, the main focusses have been on Geometry and Measurements. We have sustained knowledge of 2D shapes and their properties. We are now looking at 3D shapes and their properties but also how they differ from 2D shapes. Once we have completed this, we will move on to using different units of measurement.

In English, we will now be looking at a book about Boudica which will align to our History topic of the Roman's invasion of Britain. We will learn about her rebellion against the Roman army and the key facts about this period in history.

Can I please remind children to bring their PE kits on PE days (Tuesday and Wednesday)? Can we also make sure they have the appropriate kit for PE and clubs (e.g. tracksuit bottoms), as it is getting colder and muddler outside.

Spellings will continue as homework, given and due every Friday. You should all have the homework information sheet which will simply set out if your child completes any homework, maths challenge or reading. They can earn themselves house points. If you could write the smiley face or your initials for the child.

For your information, I have decided to change our routines for the morning (8:45 - 9:10) before we start the day. This is simply the areas I would like to work on with Willow class and it is a good time to fill within our busy schedule.

It has been another great couple of weeks in Oak class and we are showing great engagement in our learning across all subjects.

In English, we have finished our writing journey on 'Street Child', writing discussions about workhouses and their advantages and disadvantages. This linked really well with our History learning, where we used a range of sources to gather information about workhouses, which we then used in our writing.


In Maths, we used the information given to us by Miss Lee to create our own timetables for Andover cinema. This week, we have been focusing on reading and converting units of mass. We began the week by estimating and comparing the mass of different objects, using scales with different intervals. We then completed a series of problem-solving activities where we had to convert between grams and kilograms.


We have continued to develop our investigation in Science, writing predictions for our investigation question and creating risk assessments to ensure our investigation is safe.

In Computing, we have continued to use Micro:Bit software and most recently explored how we can use variables to create our own polling program. The children had lots of fun thinking of their own questions and adapting the code to fit their questions. We then had time for the class to test the code by inputting their own data. Finally, last week the children showed a great level of determination completing a series of assessments, which they faced admirably. Miss Lee was very proud of how hard the children worked during these and for their positive attitudes
