News from around school

Beech

We have started the week introducing the new class book, 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea' by Judith Kerr. The children will be exploring what is needed to host a tea party, making invitations, decorations and whatever peaks the children's interests. So far, they have created shopping lists for what they will need for a party and a recipe for Tiger Food.

Our topic in Science continues to be plants and the children have been drawing still life images and labelling them with the anatomy of a plant, explaining to their peers what the role of each part is to help it survive. Alongside this, our vegetable patch has been thriving and the children cannot believe how quickly the tomato plants have grown. They have measured their height and width and will be tracking this over the coming weeks.

The focus for Mathematics this week has been sharing, and splitting an amount into equal groups. The children have done this through practical activities involving their 'mini-me' and ensuring that each child receives the same amount of sweets! We have discussed how this can be used in real life to ensure that everything is fair. The children continued to develop this skill during their role play.







Chestnut

This week the children have been completing their assessments. They have worked incredibly hard and are putting into practice skills that they have been developing during Guided Reading and Maths lessons. I am very proud of them all.

In English this week, we have started a new book, 'Woolf'. It is the story of a wolf and a sheep who fall in love and have a son. The son struggles to fit in because he is neither sheep nor wolf. The children started the week off by drawing what the creature looked like, based on sounds of the two animals and parts of the animals. Later on in the week, the children were introduced to the book and were tasked with writing a letter from the sheep to the wolf, after their first meeting; the children were encouraged to put into practice the skills that they had developed in the last unit of work, focused on letter writing.

On Monday, the children were able to look – finally – in the silver box that has been sitting in the room for just under a week. Inside it were a number of replica items that could have been on the RMS Titanic. The children were rather excited to see the different items, working out what they could be, especially the stole (it was a mink). After this, the children were then tasked with organizing the events that led to the sinking of the RMS Titanic on the 14th and 15th April 1912. They were then given the task of considering 'whose fault was it that the ship sank?' It was wonderful to see the different discussions that were coming from this question and to see the children providing reasons for their answer.









Willow

This week, Willow have been revisiting addition and subtraction. We have been working through the basics very quickly to move onto reasoning and word problems by the end of the week. The children have been working independently with challenges around the classroom that they have been able to access themselves.

In English, we have started looking at 'Sensational', a book of poems inspired by the five senses. We started by predicting what the book is about and discussing the five senses. We have also been categorising poems and have been going outside to explore some of the sound poems using instruments to emphasise parts of the poem.

We have also been finishing off our African inspired dance for the Commonwealth games. We spent a tireless afternoon rehearsing and filming ready to make the final video. It was a lot of fun and we worked really hard to make it look as good as possible.

We have also been finishing off a science experiment where we have been growing plants in different shades of light; even putting some in a cupboard with no light to see the effect on its growth. We have discovered that even without a lot of light, plants will still grow but they will look very unhealthy, with curly leaves and a stark white colour instead of green.







Oak

This week the red kites have invaded our classroom. The children have created poems, based on the ones that we have read from The Lost Words. Once the children had drafted and edited them, they wrote them on the silhouettes which now adorn the classroom window. Solemia drew the outline, free hand and we used it as a template. If you have time, pop in and read them!

Our guided reading book has introduced us to a new character, Lucritia Cuttle and the children have made some predictions that she is going to be a villain, who knows something about the disappearance of Bartholomew Cuttle. The children have all decided that they would like a pet beetle like Baxter.

There have been lots of opportunities in maths to practice mental arithmetic and the children have also been working on their problem solving skills.

We have completed more work on the stages of evolution and made models of the different species that evolved in the different time periods.

The children have enjoyed a French lesson with Madame Bottle, where they learned some telling the time vocabulary and how to order a drink!

In P.E. the children have been practising their athletics disciplines: this week was discus.

We are hoping for the sunshine next week and a lovely last week before half term.
