# **News from around school**

#### **Beech**

Miss Billinghurst has really missed the children this week, but has loved seeing all of the hard work that the children have been doing. Today the children revisited "tricky teens", making them with numicon and dienes to represent them as 10 + (an amount of ones). In literacy, the children have been planning and making missing posters to help us in our search for Dogger. He has been missing all week! We finished the day with free play, bikes and trikes and our favourite- show and tell!



## Chestnut

Last Friday, the children started to experiment with attaching wheels and axels to a cardboard box in order to create a moving vehicle. There was a lot of discussion between them all about the best position for the elastic bands – whether they were better on the inside of the wheels to allow the wheels to move easily or on the outside to hold the wheels in place. This Friday we are going to begin the planning phase of creating our own vehicle to make in the coming weeks.

In Maths this week, the children have begun to look at standard units of weight. On Thursday, Chestnut class began with identifying the weights of different food items from their packaging; this then led into them weighing different fruits and vegetables to look at how to read a set of scales. It was interesting to watch them try and work out which fruit and vegetables they could put together to make the same weight as the melon! Today, the children have been baking, putting their reading of scales into practise. I hope you enjoy the yummy treats that they have made! (Photos to follow next week)

On Monday, in History, the children were exploring the lives of two pioneers in the field of aviation. We looked at the lives of the Wright brothers and Amelia Earhart and why they are so important. See if your child can tell a bit about either of them.







## Willow

This week, Willow have been exploring geometry. Looking at the properties of shapes, we played some games where we had to guess the shape in the bag by using targeted language. We have been also looking at lines of symmetry, folding shapes, and using mirrors to find out if shapes can be sliced in half accurately.

Also, we have finished our book in guided reading and wrote a postcard from the middle of the earth. The children have learnt lots of facts about what's 'beneath our feet.' In English, we also have come to the end our journey looking at voices in the park, and have spent the week writing our own diary entry. We had the chance to write on the computers and gain a little bit more computer literacy.







## Oak

Oak class carried out a science investigation this week, to discover whether salinity affects water resistance. They loaded up boats with pennies to find out whether the boats had more buoyancy in the salty water. Using their existing knowledge and experience of swimming in the sea, they predicted that the more salt in the water, the greater the water resistance. Most results confirmed this but there was one anomaly, which warrants further discussion. This week we have also been fact finding about the Shang Dynasty. We were astounded to learn about the way slaves were treated - why don't you ask us about some of the gruesome details!
