"My favourite game was swimming because we played water polo and then we got to play with inflatables and free play."



News from around school

Beech

The children have enjoyed multiple lessons outside this week under the chestnut tree. They all thoroughly enjoyed it and loved to implement their learning in a new space. Our class allotment is growing at an alarming rate and the children have noticed hanging green beans, tomatoes, strawberries and carrots popping up to the surface. It won't be long until we can harvest and try some of these.

In our topic work this week, we looked at paintings of Christopher Columbus' voyage and discovery of the Bahamas. We also compared this to images of modern-day explorers. The children created a table in their books using their new ruler skills and wrote about similarities and differences between the two. One of the things that was observed the most was the "weird clothes" that they used to wear in the 15th century – while of course recognising that times (and fashions) change!

In Literacy, we have been learning more about Noi and what life is like living near the beach. The children looked at the emotive and descriptive language, using this to inspire their own writing. They learned how to write an expanded noun phrase to level up their writing, giving a more in-depth description to a reader.

In Mathematics, all of the children have been learning about 2D and 3D shapes. One of the ways that they did this was by having a shape rolling competition. We discovered that the shapes that had the smallest number of faces rolled the best, especially if the faces were curved.







Chestnut

During the week in English, the children have looked at adding suffixes to words to make them into adjectives and rewrote the story, basing it around one image from the book.

In Maths this week, the children used their understanding of relationships between numbers to solve riddles and to play a game. In the riddles, they had to think about which numbers could fit in each rule and ensure their rules were specific enough to give one answer. For example: 'Mrs Finlay is thinking of a number. It is between 30 and 50. It is a multiple of 5. It is an odd number and has a 3 in the tens column. What is the number?' They also played a game in partners where they had to think about each other's rule. They chose a rule that numbers would fit (I like these numbers) which could be that the numbers had to be a 2-digit number, they were odd or they were a multiple of a number. Their partner then had to suggest numbers and try to work out the link.

In Computing this week, the children have looked at stop motion animation. They created a moving picture, which included a conversation between two characters. On Monday, the children had tennis and this week they were learning how to return the ball back to each other by controlling it and then hitting it on the bounce.







Willow

This week in Willow class we have been getting a bit active out in the sun. As we have been learning about plants, this has given us opportunity to explore and play. We learned about the life cycle of a plant and how it progresses from seed, to seedling, to adult plant. We were also introduced to pollination and seed dispersal. We played a game where some children were different bugs and they had to collect pollen from the plants. The children really enjoyed this.

In Maths, we have been continuing with fractions in year three and looking at equivalent fractions and how to find them. We have been using concrete resources to help us and representing the fractions as bars too. Year 4 have been dividing by 10 and 100 and looking at answers up to 2 decimal places. The children have been showing off their impressive presentation skills with lots of books being entered into the neatness test.

In English, we are continuing to study a book about Vikings to support our topic and have moved onto looking at the characteristics of a mini saga, how to set description and character. We have been doing lots of work focused on using effective adjectives, prepositions and conjunctions.

In History, we have been looking more at the content of the Vikings story and have been mapping where they came from and looking at how they lived, what their land was like and how they used it. We looked at some old maps and saw if we could find similar places in modern atlases. We discussed living in those places and even watched some videos of the 24 hours of sunlight they have in the northern parts of Norway. It was all very exciting.







Oak

Last Friday, our year six pupils attended a special service in Winchester Cathedral for primary school leavers. Prior to the service, we learned about the cathedral through two self-guided sessions on the meaning of old graffiti found around the inside of the building, and then we spent some time outside looking at some of the architectural details and history of the cathedral. During the service, the school was presented with a special leaver's candle to use at our own worship and the New Testament was given to our leavers.








The focus in maths this week has been on ratio for year 6 and multiples and factors for year 5. The year 5s have used Venn diagrams to find common multiples of pairs of numbers and been introduced to the definition of a factor whilst the year six children have been challenged with ratio problems.

Our foray into 'food' in French continues. Having looked at breakfast items in previous sessions, we have looked at 'lunch' and practised how to ask for sandwiches with different fillings using the phrase 'je voudrais'. To encourage talk and promote good pronunciation we have played 'morpion' (noughts & crosses) – the children asked for the sandwich in French to win the square!
