News from around school Beech

Evil Pea is loose and is causing mischief in our classroom. On Tuesday, he escaped and left clues as to where he was hiding. The class read the clues to lead onto the next clue, eventually finding Evil Pea sitting on the throne in the learning garden. Beech Class have been really excited by our new book 'Supertato' and have been inspired to write letters to the Evil Pea, make their own Supertato, and set up their own mini market during their free play. On Friday, we added speech to the images, giving the vegetables their own voice.

We went on our first ever excursion as a class to the local park. All of the adults were very impressed by the children's fantastic behaviour, walking carefully along the road and ensuring that they could always see their given adult. We went to the park to record the natural and human features that were on the playing fields, noting the buildings, playground and the vegetation.

In Science, we discussed what a habitat is and made a note of some of the habitats that we have on our school grounds. We then searched these areas to see what wildlife we could find.

In Maths, Year 1 have been partitioning teen numbers, building the understanding that they are made up on 10 and some more. Our lovely Reception girls have been learning about how to find one more and one less than an amount and have used naughty peas to do this!







Chestnut

In English this week, Chestnut have come to the end of their work on poetry. They had to rewrite Another Sensational Day, changing the verbs. Olivia changed 'a gaggle of gossip' to 'a challenge of gossip' and Barney changed 'the scent of break' to 'the happiness of break'. They have written their own poems on Friday and these will be displayed in a class book, in the classroom. In Maths, we are revisiting the topic of money. The children explored what giving change meant and had to make different combinations of money.

On Monday, in Geography, the children were using a number of different maps to cross-reference physical features around the area of Romsey. They were able to identify the rivers, the hills, fields and forests. In our next session, they will use similar maps to identify human features. In Art this week, children were introduced to the term 'tints'. We looked at a piece of Paul Klee's work, 'Separation in the Evening'. The children experimented with making different tints from colours and learned that to make a tint they had to add more white each time.











Willow

This week in Willow we have been making the most of the glorious sunshine.

In Maths, we have been focusing on mental multiplication and getting our recall of multiplication facts as fluent as possible. We have had a few challenge days where we were put into groups and had to create chants of the times tables. We made it into a little competition with scores based on teamwork, accuracy of the numbers, how in time the team were, and the originality of their chant. The children really enjoyed being outside and practising their times tables and we are moving on to representing these times tables in different ways, through arrays, bar models, and number lines.

In English, we have started a new book and played a prediction game to try to guess what the book might be about by revealing parts of the cover at a time. The children really enjoyed this game and it produced a lot of ideas in a short space of time. The book is about the Romans, which was our topic last term, so we will also have the chance to revisit some of our previous learning to solidify some that knowledge. This time, though, we will have an English focus, leading up to writing in the role of a Roman. This week is about getting to know the book and enjoy reading as a reader which has allowed us to explore some of the events in Roman History through drama.

We have also had the opportunity to handle some skeletons when looking at the difference between vertebrates and invertebrates with endoskeletons and exoskeletons. This has been fascinating and the children have been categorising lots of different animals.

Finally, as we are studying West Tytherley this term we went on a walk around the village and looked at all the physical and human features of the local area. We saw lots of trees, houses, bushes, and even a manmade lake/pond. On Friday, we are going on a virtual walk around Southampton to feature spot and compare the difference in the features of rural West Tytherley and urban Southampton.









Oak

Last week's photo from Oak class just looked like a few children holding a few 'sticks'. What a transformation this week! Having learned how to use a junior hacksaw, the children have now added to their list of skills by safely using a hot glue gun to complete their chassis for their Mars Rover. They have designed and started to build a moving part, such as a lever or a cam that operates an arm on the Rover that would collect samples from the surface of Mars. Our next challenge is to learn how to fix a cylinder onto a flat surface and get it to rotate.

Continuing with the 'Space' theme, children are in the final stages of writing a science-fiction story, based on the book 'George's Secret Key to the Universe'. I can't wait to read them.



Netball Update – Monday 21st March

We thought that the umpiring for the netball tournament was fair and kept the games going. Each team was very competitive which made the games challenging. The organization had a lot of thought put into it, with seven-minute matches over three pitches; one for practicing and the other two for matches. We played together well, and communicated, so that everyone succeeded. We enjoyed cheering on our teams and advising Broughton and West Tytherley Teams One and Two. We felt really proud about our teams winning the silver and bronze medals, that we wear with pride.

An evening learning Basic life support and first aid

This is an informal evening where you can learn how to save a life. Basic Life Support describes a set of basic life saving first aid techniques.

We will cover the Resuscitation Councils (UK) set of guidelines for first aiders to administer Basic Life Support. This will include:

- Safe management of an incident
- Dealing with an unresponsive breathing casualty (recovery position)
- Dealing with an unresponsive non-breathing casualty (CPR & Chain of survival)
- Dealing with a choking casualty both mild and severe (back slaps & abdominal thrusts)
- Using an Automated External Defibrillator if one is available

This is a demonstration of basic life saving techniques anyone can use in an event of an emergency, it will not however gain you a first aid certificate.
