News from around school

Beech

Beech Class have written letters to Mr Tiger to invite him to school for tea this week which we will be having on Friday morning with scones with cream and jam.

Meanwhile, our reception children have been busy planning a welcome party for our new reception children who will be starting next academic year. It has been so lovely to see how they have matured and are thinking about how their new classmates might feel starting at school for the first time.

In Maths, both year groups have been working on multiplication and division, halving, grouping and doubling numbers up to 25. The children have continued this into their play, doubling the cost of items in the class shop and doubling their scores with the water shooter.

We have finished our enquiry 'What was it like to come to our school in the past?' with a pretend Victorian lesson. The children sat in lines with blackboards and chalk, practicing sums. It was unanimous that the children prefer school now to how it was in the past.

I hope that you all have a restful break and I look forward to seeing you all for the final half term of the year.







Chestnut

Last Friday, the children designed their pizzas in Design and Technology. They had to make a final decision on which base they were going to use and then think about the toppings they would like, considering what would make a balanced meal. A shopping list was devised from this and they have been making their pizzas this morning. I hope you all enjoy a wonderful meal that has been prepared by the children.

In History on Monday, the children explored the differences between the classes on board the Titanic, considering the differences in the bedrooms. The children were then asked which class they would rather travel in, ignoring the fact the ship sank! It was interesting to hear some of their reasons; some children wanted a luxurious room whilst others were happy with second-class because there was enough room in those cabins and one child wanted to be in third-class because even though they have enough money for first-class, they would like others to experience the luxury.

During English lessons this week, the children have been identifying the features of a non-chronological report and writing their own, based on the character Woolf. The involved thinking about what it looks like, where it lives, what it eats and any interesting facts about it. On Thursday, the children designed their own animal and will be generating their own non-chronological report about it after half term.







Willow

This week in Willow we have been working incredibly hard. We are working towards a deadline for our poetry competition which is due on Friday. We have been producing some amazing double page spreads on the techniques, types and themes in poetry and even exploring sound by creating some music. The children have been working so hard and some of the most amazing work has been produced.

In Maths, we have been focusing on statistics and have been solving problems with tally charts, pictograms and graphs. Again, the children have been working incredibly hard to produce beautiful pieces of work, which I am very proud of.

In other subjects, we have been evaluating our science investigation and deciding if it has been a fair test and what we would do next time if we were to do it again. We looked at another investigation online and considered how they evaluated it, and then compared it to ours. This was interesting because we also got to find out if plants need soil to grow (spoiler: they do!).

Finally, we also had a whole afternoon of French, where we started learning the names of animals - which was really interesting and funny. We have tried to implement some of these names into our everyday school life, for example, we changed the menu from 'chicken nuggets' to 'nuggets de poulet.'









Oak

Oak Class have been learning their spellings using a kinaesthetic approach this week and have been committing their spellings to memory by carving them in dough. They have thoroughly enjoyed this approach, as you can tell from the pictures.

Our Science learning this week has focussed on looking at how fossils are created and the children have made their own 'mold' fossils using plaster of Paris and a range of shells.

In Maths, there has been further work securing addition and subtraction methods, and work dividing and multiplying fractions.

In the final week of our poetry unit, the children are creating their own acrostic poems, using the techniques and forms in the poems that they have studied.

We are looking forward to next term, when there are lots of opportunities to take our learning out and about, and we will start to think about the end of year play!











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
