# News from around school

# **Beech Class**

Our rainforest adventure has begun! The children entered the classroom on the first day of term with vines and rainforest animals hanging from the ceiling. Our Wendy-house has been transformed into an explorer's headquarters and our tuff trays are filled with colours and animals.

In Literacy, we have started our new learning journey 'Mr Tiger Goes Wild', the story of a tiger who is fed up of being so proper! The children have made predictions as to what they think the story is about based solely on the front cover. They then used new vocabulary to describe how the tiger is feeling. They learned words such as 'melancholy', 'spirited' and 'entrapped'.

Our afternoon topic has focused on Geography (Understanding the World). The children have been looking at the different types of extreme weather found here and in the Amazon Rainforest. These include hurricanes, drought, tornados, heatwaves, flooding and blizzards. Following this, we explored how people have adapted to survive extreme weather and the houses that they have built to withstand it. The children have role-played being estate agents, selling a house designed for extreme heat; meteorologists giving a weather forecast; architects designing a flood resistant house. They designed and created their flood resistant houses using Lego, which were displayed for parents to see. On Monday, the children went on their first ever school trip to the Living Rainforest just outside Newbury. After a long coach journey, they arrived at the centre just after 10 o'clock. They had an amazing private tour focused on adaptation in plants and animals. At lunchtime, Beech class had a picnic inside, followed by an adventure in the adventure playground. They were able to have an adventure and explore in small groups after lunch, alongside Broughton Primary School. The children were all impeccably behaved (as always!) and all the staff who attended commented on this. On Tuesday, the class wrote a recount on clipboards while lounging on a picnic blanket in the sunshine - ideal!







# **Willow Class**

We began this term, in English, with writing anonymous letters to each other on the theme of kindness. From this, we have explored the book 'The Lion and The Mouse'. The children have recalled and sequenced the story and considered the thoughts and feelings of the contrasting characters. Over the next couple of weeks, the children will recreate the moral of the story, with equivalent animals.


Last week in Maths, the children explored different strategies to solve calculations involving multiplication and division. Some of the children looked at using arrays while others used the grid method for multiplication while using place value to divide by 10.

The children have begun to explore the timing of the Ancient Greek period in relation to other periods in History, as well as how power and influence can have impact. The children looked at how power and influence affects schools and families. We moved on to look at different forms of governing a city state in Ancient Greece and discussed which was the best form (democracy was the favourite).

In Art this half term, we will be creating vases in the style of those created during our period being studied in History. We looked at some of the vases then and discussed similarities between them and which were the children's favourites and why.

in our Science lessons this half term, we are exploring the question of what plants need to grow strong and healthy. The children started their investigation by planting five runner bean seeds with five different situations – no water, no light, wrong temperature, no soil, and with everything. Over the coming weeks, the children will check progress and begin to explain why the plants have grown in certain ways.






## Oak Class

Summer term has started with a bang in Oak class with lots of fantastic learning. On our first day back, Miss Lee challenged us to become survivors! We had been subject to an (imaginary!) plane crash and were only able to take three items with us. In our groups, we had to evaluate and choose which items we thought would aid our survival before justifying our choices to the class. We were then introduced to a challenge we would face on the island and had to try and problem solve in our groups to decide how we would overcome the challenge with the items we had. This enjoyable activity was linked to our English text, 'Survivors', by David Long. We have enjoyed exploring this text over the last two weeks, reading a range of stories of people who have survived extraordinary ordeals and using these as a stimulus for writing.

In our Maths lessons, we have been developing our understanding of formal written methods for multiplication and division. In week 1, we consolidated our understanding of column method multiplication to ensure we could solve a range of problems. The Year 5 and 6 children also began to evaluate multiplication questions based on their difficulty and whether they would use a formal written method or mental strategies to solve them. In week 2, we turned to the bus stop method to help us solve 3 and 4 digit division problems. The Bus stop method (also known as short division) is a method where you place the number being divided under a 'bus stop' and the number your dividing by is on the outside of the 'bus stop'. At the end of the week, we used our knowledge of this method to help solve a range of problems.

We all became hungry in our Science lessons as we have been learning about how food is categorised into food groups. We learned the five main food groups and why these are needed for humans to grow. We explored the idea of a 'balanced diet' and created our own balanced meals, picking foods from each food group. In our second lesson, we became sports nutritionists and explored the diets of different athletes. In groups, we devised meal plans for these athletes, based on what their sport demanded from them.

Our History lessons this term are centring on World War 2. We started the topic by learning about the lead up to the war and who was involved in the conflict, before creating a timeline of significant events which occurred during the war and evaluating if these had a positive or negative impact on Britain. In our music lessons, we compared the music of World War 1 to World War 2 and how they sounded different and tried to convey different messages. We also became code breakers in our Computing lessons, just like the code breakers of Bletchley Park! Miss Lee gave us a range of different messages in secret code. We had to try and work out what the code was and find the secret message. We then had a go at making our own secret messages from the codes we found to give to our friends.
