#### From the Chair of Governors

#### Raising concerns

You may have seen that we have uploaded to the school's website the summary 'Parent View' responses which formed part of the recent OFSTED inspection. We were very pleased to receive such positive evidence of support from parents. We do know, of course, that concerns can arise and this note is to set out a process for how best to deal with those circumstances if they arise – in a way that is clear for you, as parents, and manageable for the teaching staff.

If you have a concern, your first port of call should be to contact your class teacher to discuss it with them. If you would like to discuss the issue further, you should then contact Mrs Macey and discuss it with her. We would hope that most issues can be resolved in this way.

If you feel the issue hasn't been resolved to your satisfaction, you can contact a school governor. All governors' details are available on the school website and in the school office. To make contact with governors simpler, we have suggested that you contact either Jonny Alison or Louise Payne, in the first instance – but you can reach out to any member of the governing body. If so, the school governor will act as a liaison between you and the teaching staff.

Once these processes have been completed, the next stage, if needed, would be to raise a formal complaint. The complaints policy on the school website sets out the detailed process for logging and investigating any complaints.

I hope setting out these steps helps all those involved to manage and deal with issues in a prompt and effective manner.

# News from around school

## **Beech**

Beech Class started the half term with an exciting new topic - People Who Help us! On the first day back, they were given capes and masks and instructed to solve challenges and problems in the classroom. The children spent the day in continuous provision and it was lovely to see them choosing to read and write, taking inspiration from the enhancements that were set out for them. The superhero headquarters were a firm favourite, with the children setting up their own log books to record instances and how they resolved them.

Our new literacy learning journey is 'Mog and the VET' and we are very lucky to have had Mrs Dovey visiting us on Friday to tell us all about what a vet does and how they help animals. The class have been talking about their favourite pets and have been discussing how we help animals. This week we have 'boxed up' the story, pulling key moments from it to create a structure for our own stories which we will be writing next week.

In Mathematics, our focus has been on finding more and less than a given number. The class have been using numberlines, 100 squares and concrete resources to find this. The year one children have extended this to find 10 more and 10 less than a given number within 100. Moving on from this, the children have been creating addition and subtraction number sentences and linking these as 'fact families'.

Our afternoon lesson focus this week has been Religious Education. The focus has been change, following the stories of Jesus and the Blind Man and Zacchaeus the tax collector. The children have linked these stories to change within their own lives and national and global change.



# Willow

Before half term, the children worked in groups to plan and create their earthquake-proof houses. They considered the features observed in the buildings in Japan and used some of those features and shapes within their own projects. Last week, the children tested their houses to see if they could survive an earthquake. We ventured to the top playground and placed them on boards with wheels. The children thought up different ways to test these – pushing them down ramps, going over bumpy ground, falling off the benches. By the end of the afternoon, it became apparent that all children had created sturdy structures that had survived, albeit not always the decorations.

In English over the past couple of weeks, the children have begun their new text of 'The Night Gardener'. Through this book, the children have explored expanded noun phrases, to add description, and the use of subordination to add extra detail to sentences. Next week, the children will apply these features when writing descriptive labels for topiaries.

Throughout this week in Maths, the children have been exploring time. We began the week by revisiting o'clock and half past before moving on to quarter past and quarter to. Later in the week, the children looked at 5-minute intervals past the hour and 5-minute intervals to the hour.

What is the difference between good and evil? We have been exploring this through the story of Prahlad and his father in the Hindu faith. Last week, the children identified items that represented good and evil to them whilst this week the children considered the four characters within the story and whether they were good and evil. From this, there was some fantastic discussion around Holika, the aunt; a lot of children could not decide whether she was good or evil. Ask your child which they thought she was and why, based on the events.









### Oak


It has been a busy start to the term in Oak class with lots of fantastic learning. We have been exploring the work of Shaun Tan in our English lessons, analysing 'The Red Tree' in week 1 and 'The Lost Thing' in the past week. Our main focus has been exploring the themes in each book and finding similarities and differences between the texts. More recently, we focussed on the character of 'The Lost Thing' and describing this mysterious object using similes and a range of interesting synonyms and pronouns to aid cohesion.

In our Maths lessons, we have been using our times tables facts to solve multiple possibility problems before moving onto using our times tables to help us find a fraction of a number and multiple fractions by integers. The children have been working particularly hard with showing their understanding of these concepts through different representations and using key vocabulary to explain their reasoning.

Our topic in Science this term is the classification and evolution of animals. We began by working in groups to sort animals in different ways, such as by habitat, appearance or diet, before creating dichotomous keys to help classify different animals. We then started to explore the life cycles of different types of animals and compared these. Using the table provided, we analysed information given to us to create bar charts and draw conclusions for the question 'Does the size of an animal affect its gestation period?'. We found out that there did seem to be a link and on the whole, the larger the animal, the longer the animal was pregnant.

We are becoming music producers for our computing unit this term. We spent our first lesson of this unit consolidating our understanding of the coding programme Scratch and 'tinkering' with the sound elements. Each group was tasked with creating a working digital instrument. Miss Lee was very impressed with the children's perseverance, teamwork and determination to create something unique.

Instead of our usual Tuesday afternoon of French and PE, we had the fantastic opportunity to visit South Wilts Grammar School in Salisbury to take part in a Science workshop. When we arrived, we found out that the school rabbit had been 'murdered' and it was our job to find out who did it! Over the afternoon, we did a series of different science investigations, including chromatography and testing pH levels using a universal indicator, to try to find out which teacher had committed the crime. The favourite experiment by far was the flame test, where children had to use the bunsen burners to test different 'dirt samples' to see whose footprint may have been left. The 'dirt' caused the flames to turn different colours, which was both exciting and very surprising! A big thank you to all the parents who offered to transport.
