News from around school

Beech

On Monday, the children arrived to a mysterious treasure chest in the classroom. Inside the chest they found a treasure map and a note:

"This is a magical chest full of secrets. New things will appear and disappear. Check me everyday to see what is in store, but don't open it too early or the pirates will escape!"

The children found pirates around the classroom and then made maps to hide and find their own treasures. Our pirate theme will continue to the end of the term.

In History, we have continued learning about Christopher Columbus and his discovery of the 'New World'. We heard about all of the wonderful things that he discovered when he arrived there and brought back to Spain, but the children have begun to question whether he was as good as often portrayed, by accessing the books that we have available in the topic area.

In Maths, we have started to consolidate our learning from this year to ensure that we can smoothly transition into our new year group's curriculum.





Chestnut

In History this week, the children looked at the events of Sunday 2nd September 1666. They looked at four different parts of the day and presented them in different ways – acting out, orally retelling, drawing, and writing a short diary entry. After looking at these four events, the children then wrote a diary from the point of view of a child, Tom Porter.

In Science this week, the children have started work on an investigation. They were given a marble run and explored it. The children were then asked, "How can we slow a marble down?" Through discussions, the children came up with the fact that different materials could be used. Over the next week, the children will carry out this investigation, recording their results.

On Monday, Chestnut class were challenged with writing riddles. They had to write about an object without explicitly saying what it is. Here are a couple of examples they came up with, to test you:

'It has a long tail. It likes to sit on your lap. It likes to climb. What is it?'
'It is a sport. There are lots of positions. Willow is very important. What is it?'







Willow

We have had a very exciting week in Willow as we approach the last couple of weeks of term. Firstly, on Monday we had a special morning, learning about life in Uganda. We learnt about how people live, the chores the children do, and what school looks like, and how Ugandans recycle everything. It was very interesting. And on Tuesday, Willow class had the opportunity to meet their new teacher, Miss Lee. It was really fun to get to know her and I know the children are already looking forward to next year.

Wednesday started with English, starting to look at my new favourite book 'The Barnabus Project' which is a deeply moving book that touches on a range of themes including self-belief, team work, self-acceptance, determination, facing fears, and perfection. We have had lots of discussion about the text and even created some of our own 'failed projects' toy designs that aren't quite perfect but remain special in their own way.

In the afternoon of Wednesday, the year threes and I went to the Commonwealth games, which was great fun. We had problem solving games, inflatable gymnastics, taekwondo, basketball, and multi-sport games. It was EPIC.







Oak

Monday morning saw KS2 transported to Uganda for a morning of interesting activities provided by Mr Lloyd of 'Education Uganda'. The children were introduced to a normal day in the life of a child attending school, including all the tasks that they do at home to help. At home, they walk to fetch water, feed the goats and we were shown how their school uniform was cared for. Then at school, they took part in a maths lesson with chalks and slates and learned how to count to three in Lugosa. The use of natural and recycled materials in all aspects of rural Ugandan life was a key theme during the morning that was greatly enjoyed by the children.

This global learning was followed up the next day with a session on 'wants' and 'needs' when the 'new' Oak class considered what the basic needs for children are to allow them to grow up to reach their full potential.

Transition Tuesday then began with Miss Lee.

Wednesday brought a return to normal lessons despite many being out at their secondary school taster days. In guided reading, the much-enjoyed 'Beetle Boy' by M.G. Leonard had come to an end in the previous week and it was reviewed in class, considering the mood and atmosphere of the novel. In addition, the children compared it to other stories they have read. We also began a study of the local area which will develop into a study of Andover next week.
